





Voter suppression

Mass purging of black Democrats from voter rolls and African Americans' low early voting turnout raises concerns for Hillary Clinton supporters in swing states



Online voting: a remedy against voter suppression

An election result can be radically different if you manage to suppress/encourage certain voter groups Demographics failed by the current voting system:

- voters with disabilities:
 - vision impairments, reduced mobility, mental illness
- expatriates voters
- overseas military voters

Recap: we are voting using a 19th century system!



A techno-political question

- Online voting is intertwined with voter suppression
- Hence online voting is at the same time of:
 - technical nature
 - political nature



A techno-political question

Beware of:

- whoever opposes online voting on purely technical grounds... it is also political!
- whoever dissmisses convenience of casting your vote is important... it is political!

Promoting online voting is also **political**:

 it is to believe that all demographics should have equal opportunities to cast their vote
